RE	Belonging: We Gather, Listening to God's Word or Mass	Pupils explore stewardship as taught in Genesis. Link Mass readings to Laudato Si' teaching that humans must live in harmony with creation Children write prayers of petition asking God to guide us as good stewards.	CARO: Prayer for Creation
English	The True Story of the 3 Little Pigs: Stone Age Boy	Use Stone Age Boy to explore how humans once lived closely with nature ● Contrast with today's environmental challenges . Debate in writing : "Are we better at looking after creation today than in the past?"	National History - Museum - Stone Age & Nature
Maths	Place Value; Addition & Subtraction	Apply maths to environmental data e.g., measure water usage , or record recycling amounts . Children begin handling small statistics on eco-issues.	Eco-Schools Data Ideas
Science	Animals Including Humans	Study the interdependence of humans and animals . Discuss how human actions affect food chains . Link to stewardship and protecting biodiversity.	WWF Food Chains & Habitats
Geography	Climate Zones	Children learn how different climates support life. Discuss how climate change threatens these zones. Encourage children to reflect on choices that impact climates globally.	National Geographic Kids - Climate
History	No Autism 1 Unit	Link CST lesson plan images : compare local area past vs present . Discuss how human industry has damaged or protected creation across time.	Historic England - Local History Resources
Art	No Autism 1 Unit	Link with RE alternative task: eco-garden sketching , recycled materials art , or map past/present landscapes .	Bible Society - Eco Gardens
Music	Rhythm & Prayer Songs	Explore musical responses to creation — compose soundscapes of nature (wind, water, animals). Link to gratitude for God's world.	Psalm 23, garden inspiration
PE/Outdoor	Games & Skills	Encourage eco-values outdoors : respecting fields, conserving water , avoiding waste . Could link athletics to measuring impact of running on natural vs artificial surfaces.	National Trust - Outdoor Activities
